Surrey Hills All Saints Primary School 2027/8 Admissions Policy Consultation

The Good Shepherd Trust is the Admissions Authority for Surrey Hills All Saints Primary School, School Lane, Westcott, Dorking RH4 3QF

The Trust is consulting on a proposed change to the 2027/8 admissions policy for Surrey Hills All Saints Primary School and would like to hear your views. The Trust has a statutory duty to consult on admissions arrangements if we intend to make a change.

The consultation period will run from Friday 12th December 2025 to Friday 23rd January 2026

What is the proposed change?

We propose to remove the year 3 admission point and the published admissions number (PAN) of 10.

We propose to lower the year R PAN to 15 from 30.

The proposed change to the policy is:

Removal of the following criterion

4. Children who have at least one parent who worships regularly at a Christian Church (see note 4).

Comments are not being sought on any other area of the policy.

Rationale – change of KS2 admissions PAN and change of Year R PAN

Surrey Hills All Saints has one form in year R, 1 and 2. The current structure allows for 45 pupils to be in years 3,4,5 and 6. The school has the following numbers of pupils on roll:

Year R 13

Year 1 16

Year 2 19


Year 3 23

Year 4 18

Year 5 15

Year 6 24

The Year R places required in Mole Valley is not predicted to increase:



In academic year 2023 to 2024 there were around 800 pupils in year 7 in Mole Valley. Demand is projected to plateau at around 795 pupils before peaking at around 830 pupils in 2026 to 2027. Besides an outlier of around 810 in 2029 to 2030, Year 7 demand is then expected to fluctuate between 780 and 750 pupils for the rest of the planning period.

There are currently over 700 vacant places in Mole Valley:

We propose removing the admissions point at KS2 to enable Surrey Hills All Saints to become a half-form-entry primary school with up to 15 pupils in each year group. This will protect the future viability of the school.

With the current surplus of places in Mole Valley, and future predictions, we do not see any pupil being disadvantaged by these changes. Our places offered in year R is a three-year falling trend.

Rationale – removal of criterion 4

The Trust seeks to be as inclusive as possible with our admissions policies and procedures. We welcome pupils from all faiths and none and we are keen to make our admissions policy as clear as possible about this. We have, therefore, proposed to remove all church-related criteria from our school admissions policies. Some parents have suggested that these criteria have been a barrier to applying to our schools.

Potential Impact

In the past three years, the number of pupils admitted into the school is as follows:

As no pupils has been admitted under this criterion in the past three years, we do not foresee and significant impact on the school's admission

What happens next?

Please note that you will not receive an individual response to your submission and no changes to the proposed policies will be made during the consultation period. After the consultation has closed, all responses will be collated and presented to the Trust Board during the first half term of the spring term 2026. The Board will then decide whether to proceed with the proposed change as well as determining the admission arrangements for all other Trust schools for which no changes are

proposed. Once determined the final admission arrangements for all schools will be placed on the

websites of the individual schools and sent to the Local Authority and Diocese.
